Video Summary

South Africa continues as our backdrop for our lighthearted look at creation, life, animals and the African outback. The word Safari has its origins in the Arabic word "Safara" meaning travel.

As Chad begins his journey into the African bush he gains a greater understanding of God's detailed plan of creation and that His involvement in creation is obvious to anyone who chooses to look with the eyes of faith. It is within this colorful panorama, that we can glean truths from some very unexpected scenarios. From the foolish monkey, to the majestic white Rhino, God affords us the opportunity to learn more about Him and ourselves by the often-ignored examples found in nature.



Icebreaker ~ Bonding Time

A Vermont native found himself in a difficult position while touring the Eagle's Rock African Safari Zoo with a group of thespians (teenage theatre students) from St. Petersburg, Russia. Ronald went to extremes to demonstrate the power of Crazy Glue, one of America's many marvels, to the Russians.

To prove the effectiveness of Crazy Glue, he rubbed several ounces of the adhesive onto the palms of his hands and jokingly placed them on the buttocks of a passing rhino.

Facts, Figures & Illustrations ~ Safari Animal Facts

Established in 1895, Hluhluwe-Imfolozi Game Reserve is the oldest game park in Africa and is the only under formal conservation in KwaZulu Natal, where the Big 5 occur. Set in the heart of Zululand, the game reserve offers visitor activities - from self-guided walks, auto-trails, game drives, to picnic sites. Viewing hides overlook pans and waterholes enabling visitors to see animals at close range.

The Park covers some 237,000 acres and contains an immense diversity of fauna and flora. It became world renowned for its white rhino conservation.

Vervet monkeys living near areas inhabited by people can become pests, stealing food and other items and raiding crops. Good climbers, jumpers and swimmers, they often elude capture.

Vervet monkeys have been known to destroy crops in Kenya and are classified as vermin in South Africa, where they can be shot without previously obtaining a permit.

Adult hippos can't actually swim and are not generally buoyant. When in deep water, they usually propel themselves by leaps, pushing off from the bottom. They move at speeds up to 8 km/h (5 mph) in water.

An Elephant's ears are also used in certain displays of aggression and during the males' mating period. If an elephant wants to intimidate a predator or rival, it will spread its ears out wide to make itself look more massive and imposing.

Elephants communicate over long distances by producing and receiving low-frequency sound (infrasound), a sub-sonic rumbling, which can travel through the ground farther than sound travels through the air. This can be felt by the sensitive skin of an elephant's feet and trunk, which pick up the resonant vibrations much as the flat skin on the head of a drum. To listen attentively, every member of the herd will lift one foreleg from the ground, and face the source of the sound, or often lay its trunk on the ground.

A popular theory of the origins of the name White Rhinoceros is a mistranslation from Dutch into Afrikaans and English. The Afrikaans word "wit", meaning "white" in English is said to have been derived by mistranslation of the Dutch word "wijd", which means "wide" in English and is spelled "wyd" in Afrikaans.

A rhinoceros can sleep either standing or lying down.

The average weight of a rhinoceros is over three to four thousand pounds.

A rhinoceros can run at 30-40 MPH.

Discussion Questions

1. Discuss the issues concerning creation versus evolution. God is very clear that the earth and fullness there of belongs to Him. What are the problems we encounter when we don't acknowledge Him in the most obvious display of His love and Power: Creation?
2. Discuss the issues of isolation and separation. What does Jesus say about being alone and what are the dangers of being separated from a loving, nurturing group. (Hint: Matthew 18:12)
3. Look at the idea of conservation and its application in your life. As we have proper stewardship principles in place in our natural lives, why shouldn't we apply this discipline to our spiritual lives. Should we protect the "endangered" aspects of our lives ?
4. Discuss the story of Jacob and Esau in Genesis 25: 32-34. How did Esau's desire for temporary pleasure effect him? What do we do in our lives that are similar to this Biblical example? Are we trading our eternal reward for a moment of temporal satisfaction?
